The Right Reverend Francis Kyung-Jo Park was consecrated as the 4th Bishop of Seoul in Seoul Cathedral on 7th April 2005 and was enthroned on the 1st December.



The Right Reverend Solomon Jong-Mo Yoon was consecrated and enthroned as the Fourth Bishop of Busan at Keimyung University Seongso Campus Adams Chapel on Saturday 3rd December 2005.



#### The Chairman writes...

On behalf of the Trustees of the Korean Mission Partnership I would like to thank you for your most generous support and prayers for the mission work of the Anglican church in Korea.

It is wonderful to see that South Korea has risen to become 11th of world economy out of the ruins of the Korean War in the 1950's. Also it is very encouraging to see that the small seeds sown by Bishop Corfe and his team have grown up to now become a Province of the Anglican Communion. They are now sending missionaries to Japan and the Philippines and awaiting for the doors to be opened for the North Korean Mission.

The Korean Mission Partnership is still supporting the Dioceses of Busan and Daejeon as they have many small mission stations but we have ventured out to support the North Korean refugees in China for some years to come. Due to the difficult diplomatic relationships between North and South Korea, many refugees from the North suffer incredible hardships. It is difficult for the South Korean church to be seen to be directly involved in supporting refugees but members of the Korean Mission Partnership in this country should suffer no such difficulty. There is a letter with a special appeal included in this edition of Morning Calm.

Voluntary members of Trustees help in so many ways to run the Korean Mission Partnership. I am most grateful for their sacrificial support for the Mission, especially Miss Eilene Hassal who assisted Canon Masters from 1990 and then after becoming honorary secretary and treasurer in 1993 has just retired after years of faithful service. Special thanks is also due to Fr Michael Davenport for more than 30 years of dedicated service to the mission and loving hospitality to so many Korean visitors.

#### From the Chairman of the KMP - Revd Luke Lee:

"Recently, I visited the Chinese Province of Jilin, which borders North Korea, to see if there was anything the Korean Mission Partnership (KMP) could do to help the refugees from North Korea in China and the starving in North Korea.

North Korea is a closed country so it is hard to know what is going on. I have been told that human rights are non existent and any opposition is dealt with harshly by the regime – with the whole family often sent to labour camps. During the first four months of 2004, the camp's food ration remained at 300 grams per person per day – which is not enough to live on. I also heard that at least 3 million people have died of starvation since the end of the Korean War and real suffering still continues – except for the privileged few and the armed forces. About 300,000 people have defected from North Korea and settled in China, Russia and other countries. So is the situation completely hopeless? Out of sight and out of mind?"

Father Luke continued: "Although the problem is largely political, and there is a limit to what the KMP & its supporters can do, we know we cannot ignore the plight of the refugees and the starving people of North Korea. During my visit to China, I was very fortunate to find a doctor who is using his own money to provide food and medicines for the refugees. As his resources are limited, he urgently needs more money to continue his valuable work:

## The Society of the Holy Cross

The Community of St Peter at Woking has a very long association with the Korean church. This started in 1892 when the first sisters arrived - just three years after Bishop Corfe established the Anglican Church in Korea. Between then and 1925 some 17 sisters were sent out by CSP. They fostered many Korean vocations to the religious life and an indigenous community, the Society of the Holy Cross, was established. This is the Christmas letter from Mother Angela SHC to friends and supporters around the world:

We are very thankful for your prayers and love so that we have been able to continue our religious life. First of all, we are very happy to celebrate the 80th anniversary of our community, which we held at St Mary and St Nicholas' Cathedral in Seoul on 15 September, 2005. About four hundred friends participated at Holy Eucharist and the garden party in the evening. To commemorate this anniversary, we published 'The Sisterhood of the Holy Cross in Pictures: the First Eighty Years.

In addition to the celebration, we have had many other joyful events. In May, twenty seven members joined the Associates and they are keeping monthly training with prayer and study. We are very thankful for the Junior Profession of two Novices, Martha and Prisca, held on 29 June. Clair and Cecilia joined our community in September and are happily living with us in the Novitiate. We also had our Annual Retreat, The Religious Friendship of Four Seasons, from 1 to 10 September. It was inspiring to have this eight day retreat, conducted by the Revd Philip Neri Kim SJ.

We are glad to announce that sixty elderly ladies at St. Ann,s Convalescent Home and thirty nine handicapped persons at St Bona's House are well and happy under the warm care of staffs sharing the love of God. It was good for Sister Catherine to visit St Peter's Community in UK in July 2005 and for Sister Caroline Jane CSP to visit Korea for the 80th Anniversary.

In the mother house, we continue living with daily prayers and work. Our work includes holding regular spiritual programmes for groups and individuals who long to mature their relationship with God. We have also changed our habit to a more modern and simple style since Easter 2005.
